The Congressional Award Program is open to all youth in the US between the ages of 14 and 23 regardless of ability, circumstance, or socioeconomic status. Participants earn Bronze, Silver, and Gold Certificates and Bronze, Silver, and Gold Medals. Each level involves setting goals in four program areas; Voluntary Public Service, Personal Development, Physical Fitness, and Expedition/Exploration. It is the highest award for youth legislated and presented by the United States Congress. It is a non-competitive program designed to acknowledge young people for their initiative, achievement, and service.
